Event

City of Lincoln City Fourth of July Celebration and Fireworks Show. This is a yearly event with the major attraction to visitors being the Taft area beaches as the fireworks show occurs over the Siletz Bay. As with most holidays, the fourth also brings many visitors to area hotels and vacation rental homes.

LCPD Resource Deployment

On July 4, 2024, all participating LCPD officers were assembled at the Taft Fire Hall, where they were briefed on the July 4th operations plan as well as provided with equipment and resource materials to assist them in enforcing fireworks statutes.

A total of 20 sworn officers and 4 support staff were deployed for the event. This included the following:

- 1 Police Chief
- 2 Police Lieutenants
- 14 LCPD Officers
- 2 Lincoln County Sheriff's Office Deputies
- 1 Newport Police Officer
- 3 Police/Fire/Medical Dispatchers
- 1 Evidence Technician

- 1 Executive Assistant

Area/Duty assignments during the event included the following:

- 1 Night Shift Patrol Supervisor
- 3 LCPD Officers assigned to regular Night Shift Patrol.

Other Enforcement:

During the evening officers conducted traffic and parking enforcement throughout the city, with the focus being the Taft event area.

Officers made more than 50 contacts with citizens and visitors and provided education regarding LC's ban on **all** fireworks, detailing the use restrictions of these fireworks.

No citations for possession of fireworks were issued as officers were unable to establish probable cause of possession during contacts where fireworks were being ignited.

FIREWORKS ARE PROHIBITED IN LINCOLN CITY

The sale, offer for sale, possession, and use of fireworks is prohibited everywhere within the city of Lincoln City - including all private and public property (such as beaches, streets, and parks). Violators will be fined and/or prosecuted for lighting any type of firework here. This includes sparklers and novelty devices.

All are invited to enjoy a professional public firework show over Siletz Bay on the 4th of July. Festivities will begin at noon, with live music at the Taft Park Pavilion.

Question: Should the City Council approve Resolution 2024-25?

Staff Recommendation:

Staff has no recommendation.

Authority:

City of Lincoln City Charter Chapter II Section 2.1 authorizes the city to exercise all powers which the constitutions, statutes and common law of the United States and of this state expressly or impliedly grant or allow municipalities as fully as though this charter specifically enumerated each of those powers.

Municipal Code 2.04.090: All resolutions shall be in writing and numbered consecutively in the order in which they are received.

Background:

This matter was brought to staff by proponents of the resolution requesting that the City Council consider encouraging the Oregon Legislature to pass legislation ending the sale of flavored tobacco products. The proponents submitted the model resolution. Staff did not amend the model resolution except make the form consistent with Lincoln City resolutions. Exhibit 1 to the proposed resolution contains citations to the source of data contained in the "whereas" clauses.

Sample Resolution in Support of Restricting the Sale of Flavored Tobacco Products and Protecting Kids from a Lifetime of Nicotine Addiction.

WHEREAS Big Tobacco's use of candy flavors like bubblegum, blue raspberry, root beer, and minty menthol hooks generations of consumers – especially kids, students and communities of color – on the massive hits of nicotine their tobacco products can deliver¹; and

WHEREAS the millions Big Tobacco spends on lobbying so retailers can continue selling their predatory, candy-flavored products has triggered what the Surgeon General and the FDA have called an “epidemic” of e-cigarette use across the nation²; and

WHEREAS big Tobacco spends \$115 million for marketing in Oregon each year³; and

WHEREAS 10.8% of Oregon 11th grade students use e-cigarettes⁴, and 5,000 Oregon kids under 18 try cigarettes for the first time each year; and

WHEREAS tobacco companies are creating a cycle of addiction that puts taxpayers – whether they smoke or not – on the hook for \$373.6 million in annual Medicaid costs caused by smoking in Oregon⁵; and

WHEREAS each year, tobacco use kills over 8,000 Oregonians and costs almost \$5.7 billion in medical expenses and lost productivity⁶; and

WHEREAS in 2022, 25% of tobacco retailers inspected in Oregon sold tobacco to underage buyers⁷; and

WHEREAS nine of 10 adults who smoke report that they started smoking by 18⁸; and

WHEREAS two thirds of Oregon youth tobacco users use flavored tobacco compared to about 26% of older adult tobacco users, thus beginning a life of addiction because of the attraction of flavors⁹;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the _____ (LOCAL GOV) strongly encourages the Oregon Legislature to pass legislation ending the sale of flavored tobacco products. We must protect kids from Big Tobacco’s candy-flavored and minty-menthol tobacco used to lure young people into a lifetime of addiction.
